SHC AWARDS

Southgate Hockey Chilis Roll fo Honour

Southgate has a long and rich history spanning more than 125 years. Here you will find the names of past and present Southgate members who have won awards and honours, who have held posts and who have represented England at hockey.

Dunlop Johnson Award

The award is the Club's highest honour, presented in memory of Jock Dunlop, a long serving member who made an outstanding contribution to the life of the Club. In particular, during the hockey seasons of the late 1960s, he ran the bar at our former clubhouse in Waterfall Road almost single handed. His unstinting efforts were rewarded by his election as a Vice President. Jock died in the 1970s on his way to umpire a Southgate hockey match, and his funeral was one of the largest ever in hockey memory - attended by clubs from all over London and the home counties. At his wake, held in "his bar", his family, friends and colleagues conceived the idea and then donated to the award.

Following Murray Johnson's death in 2008, the committee decided to change the name to the Dunlop Johnson award. Murray became a member in 1938 and made a huge contribution to the club in the post war years. He was Secretary, Treasurer and President and, like Jock, when he stopped playing he umpired as seriously as he played. Jock and Murray were good friends and the backbone of the club for many years - jointly they were members for over 100 years.

The prestigious Dunlop Johnson award is presented each year to the Southgate member judged to have made the most outstanding contribution to the Club, both on and off the pitch.

Italian experiences – World League 2



Back in February I represented Italy at the World League Round 2 tournament in Chula Vista, California.

For Italy it was the first time participating in the second round, after qualifying from the Round 1 tournament played in September 2014 in Portugal, and we arrived in California as the lowest ranked out of the eight teams.

We tend to have very few opportunities to play in competitions in other continents, so we were very excited for the tournament, even though we knew that we coming in as the ultimate underdogs. The beautiful weather definitely made us Italians feel at home, although the same cannot be said about the Californian food.

The biggest surprise however, was the local's excitement when we were walking in the streets or eating in restaurants: we'd never had so many people stop us to take pictures, ask questions, and so on. It was probably the first time we actually felt regarded like international athletes

The tournament went really well for us - it's a lot easier when you have low expectations! A couple of narrow losses against the Irish (2-0) and Austria (3-1) were quickly forgotten when we beat Chile (2-1) in the pool stage.

In the quarter-finals we met the top-ranked Canadians, in what was a very special game for me, having lived two years in Vancouver and played alongside many of the national team players. Canada proved too strong for us (4-0), but a hard-fought 2-1 win against Kwan Browne's Trinidad & Tobago ensured we finished the tournament in sixth place, crucially one spot ahead of Southgate teammates Miller and Gandhi, who were playing for the USA.

Overall it was a great experience playing against countries where hockey has a much greater tradition. We went into the tournament with the expectation of taking one match at a time, and we were very happy with our performances and results.

A Southgate Hitory Leson

The Hockey Club for some time before the Second War, had operated at the Walker Ground in Waterfall Road, near the Cherry Tree pub in Southgate. The ground had been put into the Walker Trust, a charity set up by one the Walker family of Taylor Walker, brewers from the local big house, later to be Northmet House. Three Walker brothers had played cricket for England, and as a result in some ways the Hockey Club appeared to be the junior partner to the Southgate Cricket Club, and not merely because of the permanent fact that the winter season was less favourable to the summer for sport on grass

When I joined the Hockey Club shortly after demobilisation in 1948, there were still a few who had been members before the club's suspension during the 2nd World war. These people claimed that the "Tankards" name had been used for a separate section of Hockey players before the War and could not be used otherwise! Hence sometime later when a new name for a trip to a tournament in France was required the name "Pistons" was adopted as a completely separate club to operate solely in the summer, when otherwise there was not any Hockey being played.

However the majority of the active membership in 1948 was exservicemen. Notably the person who I recall most clearly was the club secretary and by then 3rd.X1 captain Murray Johnson. He had been a



schoolboy member pre-war whilst at Highgate School, and by D-Day found himself commanding a small detachment of AA gunners on a landing craft in the fleet heading for Normandy.

By the time he got to Brussels and the Germans were starting to collapse, there was general concern that people might get sent to continue the war in the Far East against Japan which was felt to be very unfair. Murray was therefore able to convince somebody that as he could speak German as result of a pre-war visit he should stay, but in fact he spent most of his time before demobilisation playing Hockey there in Brussels.

The other member I recall from 1948 was Stewart Johnson, the 2nd XI captain and club treasurer

(but not related to Murray). He had worked pre-war in one of the big Banks, but during the war he had risen to command a battalion of Armoured Cars in the Reconnaissance Regiment. It now seems hardly surprising that he later found it difficult to settle down back in "civvy. st."!

At that time the Club President was Sammy Saville, a pre-war International player, who was also the President of the Hockey Association. When somewhat later I aspired to be the Fixture Secretary and attend committee meetings, I found that Sammy invariably attended and kept very much in touch.

One of his sons Peter was also a playing member after the War.

The Club membership was exclusively male. I think that we were aware that girls played the game, and in fact we also knew that they put on a big Finals Day somewhere in London each year but did not feel any need to associate with them. I do not recall that there were many "gays" in the membership then. In fact I do not think "gay" had been invented then. I had an in-law named Gay, and he certainly was not a "gay".

Our fixture list was exclusively with the other big London clubs apart from regular fixtures with the Royal Engineers and the Royal Air Force who were able to fly their members from all over Europe to play in London.

There was a considerable shortage of both cars and the petrol to run them on at the time and practically all members travelled to games by public transport.

In addition there were no artificial pitches and a considerable amount of

time and trouble had to be expended in keeping the grass playing surface in useable condition during the Hockey season. This ran from the beginning of September each year until around the end of March. Outside these times the ground at Waterfall Road and the old pavilion was taken over by the Southgate Cricket Club. Both clubs operated under the control of the Walker Trust, the members of which were distinguished citizens such as Rupert Brookes, a director of the Express Dairy, Sir Cyril Hawker, a Director of the Bank of England, and Andrew Knox, a partner in Linklaters, a City solicitors firm who attended the Hockey club committee meetings regularly.

Gradually over the years from 1948 onwards, a great deal has changed. After some time the Hockey Club renovated the interior of the pavilion at the Walker Ground. Subsequently in conjunction with the Southgate Cricket Club the second ground there was cultivated and laid out. Then the decision was taken to seek funding and in due course to design and build a new pavilion with squash courts. With the benefit of hindsight it is questionable

whether the Hockey Club was obliged to agree to the appointment of an architect with a cricketing background!

Ultimately the Hockey Club was forced to recognise that it could no longer flourish whilst restricted by the terms of the Walker Trust. This in itself led to the creation of the Southgate Sports and Leisure Trust and thus, the move to Trent Park. It also led belatedly to the recognition that both sexes must be involved. The ladies have been involved to a most considerable extent, and their contribution has been enormous and very valuable.

There has been a great deal of management involved over the years and the need for this will inevitably continue. Whether this will be provided voluntarily is less certain!

Warwick Hoyle was a truly remarkable man, he was exceptional and a very very dear friend for many years. The likes of Warwick are very rare. Not only did I play hockey with him, not only did I sit on many committees with him, not only did I do business with him, not only did I develop a Spanish villa with him, not only did I go on umpteen hockey tours with him, not only did I party with him, not only did I dress up for his legendary wine and cheese parties with him – but above all of that, he was fiercely loyal and always ready to lend a hand – nothing was too much trouble.

I first formed a friendship with him through his organisation of the annual wine and cheese parties. These events had our own members performing as a Palm Court Trio complete with standard lamp. In addition he wanted an act that involved no payment – I was happy to oblige!!! These parties started life at the Walker Ground and then moved on to the Old Cholmeleians Sports Ground, a very secluded clubhouse, just perfect for what Warwick needed. An opportunity for our club to "let it's hair down" just before Christmas – and boy did he know how to organise a party!!

After every club party, usually late at night, there was always the same Warwick one liner flying about "I'm having an all night party back at my place, will you join us?" Invariably these much sought after invitations were issued to young ladies first. Having got the foundations in place his regular supporters would then be invited along to give him a hand.

In all matters regardless of whether it was personal, commercial or club business, Warwick was always scrupulously fair, painstakingly methodical and did everything when he said he would. Because of my background in building, I was fortunate enough to be invited by Warwick to join him and a mate to develop a villa in Southern Spain. The two of them had got pissed whilst overnighting in a small Spanish village on the southern coast of Spain and agreed to buy a plot of land. When they inspected it the following day they discovered it was at the top of an undeveloped mountain overlooking the sea!! They needed some poor unsuspecting dummy who knew a bit about building to help and so in I went!! The resulting villa has been the holiday location for many of Warwick's friends and family and indeed many hockey club members - it is known as Casa Manana, but that's another chapter.

For many years Warwick also organised the 3A hockey tours to foreign parts as well as touring with Pistons, Llamas, Purley Gobblers and Members Hockey Clubs – I went with him on many of these tours and I think it's fair to say that apart from being a brilliant organiser he always entertained us with his song "Goodnight Horse" usually sung in a variety of European languages and in particular in the host country's language, so that our host club's members could join in!

When I summoned up some courage and decided to leave my bachelor behaviour behind and marry Rafia, there was only one possible candidate to be my Best Man, of course it was Warwick. He subsequently became Godfather to our son, Cyrus and he never missed his birthday!

There are so many highly entertaining stories about Warwick and the one I told on the day of his funeral is this: We were on tour in Denmark and having returned to our hotel well pissed, we discovered that a private party had finished at the hotel and that the guests had spilled out into the bar. In we marched for a nightcap and Warwick found himself next to a most distinguished looking man with white hair, goatee beard, purple sash and medals. Where are you from lad? Warwick enquired slapping him on the back. The gentlemen replied "I'm the King of Norway" to which Warwick in a typically unflustered response said "King of where lad"? Needless to say the gentleman was the King of Norway!!

Our club could not have had a better member whether organising, as chairman of the Trust, as editor of the magazine or as organiser of the London Marathon runners. We have lost someone who served us with distinction and was the very best friend anyone could have – let us celebrate all that he did and let us continue to be successful – that is what he would want most of all.

Rules Change Guidance From England Hockey

In late 2014, the International Hockey Federation (FIH) announced some changes to the Rules of Hockey. These changes included the incorporation of the previous FIH Tournament Regulations that related to: a) breaking early at a penalty corner; b) the two-minute green card;

and c) the use of the stick above the shoulder. All the changes are outlined on pages 5-7 of the FIH Rules Book.

The changes came into effect at



International level from 1st January 2015 and were implemented in the National Leagues on 31st January 2015. With effect from 1st July 2015, all of the new rules will be played throughout

the 11-a-side game in England, at all age groups.

The new rules have proved to be both successful and popular at international and national league level. They improve the flow of the game, as they result in fewer interruptions, and they help umpires

with game management. It is also very good news that the game of hockey across the country will be played to the same rules.

Breaking At A Penalty Corner

New Rule:

- If the attacker taking the penalty corner injection feints at playing the ball they should be sent beyond the centre-line and should be replaced by another attacker.
- If a defender, other than the GK, crosses the line before the injector has played the ball then they must go beyond the centre-line and cannot be replaced by another defender.
- If the GK, or player with GK privileges (a "kicking back"), crosses the line before the injector has played the ball then the defending team must defend the PC with one fewer player.
- If an attacker enters the circle before the injector has played the ball then they should be sent beyond the centre-line.

Rationale for the change: The new rule has proved to be hugely successful in prompting a significant reduction in the number of early breaks, by both attackers and defenders.

Two-Minute Green Card

New Rule: When an offending player is awarded a green card, he/she will be required to leave the field of play for a period of two minutes.

Rationale for the change: The introduction of the two-minute green card provides an additional management aid to umpires, which has proved very effective in offering an intermediate penalty between a verbal caution and a yellow card.

Use Of The Stick Above The Shoulder

New Rule: Players can play the ball when the ball is above shoulder height, provided that they do so in a controlled manner and in a way that does not create or lead to danger.

Rationale for the change: To add another dimension and set of skills to the game, and to remove the need for umpires to make marginal judgements about the height of the stick with sometimes far-reaching consequences.

Free Hits Awarded Within 5M Of The Edge Of The Circle

New Rule: A free hit awarded within 5 metres of the edge of the circle can be taken from the point of the offence. The ball still has to travel at least 5 metres before it can be played into the circle, or alternatively has to be touched by another player of either team, other than by the player taking the free hit.

Rationale for the change: Previously having to take the ball back to the 5m dotted line was seen as a real disadvantage to the attacking team (as it allowed the defence to re-organise) and it disrupted the flow of the game.

Re-Start After The Ball Has Been Unintentionally Played Over The Back-Line By A Defender (And No Goal Is Scored)

New Rule: Play will be re-started by the attacking team with the ball on the 23 metres line and in line with where it crossed the back-line.

Rationale for the change: To open up angles and options for the attacking team and to prevent the ball getting 'stuck' in the corner amongst a crowd of players.

'UP 10' RULE

Please note that the rule that allowed an umpire to progress a free hit by up to 10 metres has been deleted. The rule is now redundant owing to the new free hit rules and the ability to self-pass, while any other misconduct can be managed using other rules or personal penalties.



2015 Sixes Report

After a bumper 2014 edition of the sixes, this year's event had to go some to beat the fun and enjoyment that was enjoyed last year but thanks to Lucy Sheffield's organisation, Liz, all the umpires and everyone at the club the 2015 sixes tournament must rank as one of the most successful to date!

With 11 ladies teams and 10 mens team signed up not even the slightly overcast skies of Friday night could dampen the enthusiasm and three key factors pulled together for the perfect June weekend: competitive hockey, cheap bar deals plus the all important sunshine – well for 50% of the time at least.

With the hockey keenly contested, the Southgate teams were looking to retain the titles they had won the previous year and in particular Islington HC looking to add another star to their iconic and world renowned logo!
